***Hilary E. J. Andrew, M.D.***

Dr. Andrew went to medical school in London, England and worked as a pediatrician for ten years. She came to Portland as a neonatologist after that and then trained in psychiatry here at Maine Medical Center. Her special interests are developmental psychiatry, psychodynamic psychotherapy, psychosomatic disorders, and pediatric consultation-liaison psychiatry. She is fascinated as to how we become who we are and believes that compassion and empathy are the essential roots of good psychiatry. She is a general, child and adolescent psychiatrist. She has a strong interest in mentoring residents. She also maintains a separate practice in Portland.

***Ronald E. Bailyn, M.D.***

Dr. Bailyn is a graduate of the University of Connecticut School of Medicine. After Psychiatry Residency at Maine Medical Center, he completed the Harvard Geriatric Education Center Faculty Training Module in Psychiatry at McLean Hospital. Dr. Bailyn has worked in a multi-disciplinary psychiatric private practice and has served as Director of the Geriatric Psychiatry Division since 1995. His interests include geriatric neuropsychiatry, psychiatry in the nursing home, and models of collaborative geriatric medicine practice. Dr. Bailyn holds a Certificate of Added Qualification in Geriatric Psychiatry, is a NAMI exemplary psychiatrist, and is listed in Best Doctors in America.

***Cindy Boyack, M.D., FRCPC***

Dr. Boyack graduated from the University of Toronto Medical School. She then went on to complete two years of training in the family practice residency program at University of Massachusetts Medical Center in Worcester, Massachusetts. She left family medicine to pursue a career in psychiatry and completed her residency in psychiatry at McGill University, in Montreal, Quebec. She is board certified in both the US and Canada. Currently, she is the director of outpatient psychiatry at Maine Medical Center in the adult Mental Health Clinic. In addition, she coordinates the outpatient training experience for residents, and is an advisor for the medical student rotation. Her interests include teaching, consultation-liaison with primary care physicians, community psychiatry, and women's mental health and reproductive issues. She also enjoys working with ethnically diverse populations.

***John J. Campbell III, M.D., FANPA***

Dr. Campbell is a graduate of the University of Vermont College of Medicine. He completed his residency training in Adult Psychiatry at Brown University, where he was Chief Resident. Dr. Campbell went on to complete a Fellowship in Neuropsychiatry at Brown University. He was Associate Residency Training Director at Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas, where he was also Director of Ambulatory Psychiatric Services and Vice-Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry. During his tenure in the Air Force, Dr. Campbell was voted Department of Psychiatry Educator of the Year three out of 4 years of active duty. Following this, Dr. Campbell was Director of Neuropsychiatry for Henry Ford Behavioral Health and Medical Director of Kingswood Hospital at the Henry Ford Health System in Detroit, Michigan. While at HFHS, Dr. Campbell was voted Department of Psychiatry Educator of the year twice, and was the first faculty member to receive this honor for two consecutive years. Dr. Campbell is currently Director of Psychiatric Services at Maine Medical Center. He is a Fellow of the American Neuropsychiatric Association where he serves as Chair of the Education and Credentialing Committees.

***William L. Cook, Ph.D.***

Dr. Cook is Psychiatry Research Director. He received his Ph.D. in Family Studies from the University of Connecticut at Storrs in 1987. While completing his doctorate he worked in the Research Department of the Institute of Living in Hartford, CT. After completing his doctorate, he was an NIMH Postdoctoral fellow at the UCLA Family Project (Michael Goldstein, supervisor) for two years. His postdoctoral fellowship was followed by six years of teaching in the Department of Human Ecology at The University of Texas at Austin, after which he joined the faculty and staff at Maine Medical Center. Dr. Cook's expertise is the quantitative analysis of interpersonal systems. A former student of David A. Kenny, he pioneered the application of the Social Relations Model to family systems data and extended the application of Kenny's Actor-Partner Interdependence Model to include the analysis of experimental trials (treatment outcomes) involving marital couples or other family members. He was the recipient of a National Science Foundation grant to study attachment relationships within families and has published 15 articles in peer reviewed journals. Dr. Cook teaches Research Methods in the MMC/University of Vermont residency program. He is a member of the American Psychological Association, The International Society for Ecological Psychology, and the Association for Clinical Psychosocial Research.

***Mark Fulton M.D.***

Dr. Fulton graduated from Yale University with a BA in Mathematics, then went on to receive his medical degree from the University of Texas in Galveston. He completed his general psychiatry residency at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics in Iowa City, concurrently earning his MS in Biostatistics and NIMH Fellowship in Psychiatric Epidemiology and Biometry. Dr. Fulton returned to University of Texas as Assistant Professor of Psychiatry as well as serving as medical director for the Dallas VA Medical Center, medical director for the Dallas County MHMR, and medical director for the Community Support Treatment Program at the VA Medical Center in Dallas. Dr. Fulton joined the medical staff at Spring Harbor Hospital in 1999, first as staff psychiatrist and later as Associate Medical Director, where he also became affiliated with the Maine Medical Center medical staff. Dr. Fulton oversees a dedicated CBT unit at SHH, and has also begun a clinical trial of Olanzapine in Agitated Schizophrenia. Dr. Fulton has a special interest in Genetic Epidemiology.

***Rosalind Gold, M.D.***

Dr. Rosalind Gold is a graduate of Tufts University School of Medicine. She did a year of research in clinical psychopharmacology at McLean Hospital before going on to residency at the University of Vermont. She transferred to the Institute of Living/University of Connecticut program and stayed on as faculty at the University of Connecticut for several years, teaching psychopharmacology to medical students and residents. She worked in private practice briefly while in Burlington, Vermont before returning to community-based practice here in Maine. She has been working with adults in the Outpatient Department of Maine Medical Center/Spring Harbor Hospital since the year 2000. She believes in an educational and collaborative approach with patients and staff alike. She is actively involved in medical student and resident education, again particularly in the area of psychopharmacology. She lives in Portland with her husband and two daughters.

***Andrew G. Hinkens, M.D., M.P.H.***

Dr. Hinkens received his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania and his M.P.H. from Boston University. He completed his post graduate training at Maine Medical Center and was Director of the Child Psychiatry Consultation Service for ten years. He was appointed Director of Training in Child Psychiatry in 1996, and continues to foster an interest in collaborating with primary care physicians and community mental health providers. Dr. Hinkens is a consultant to several residential treatment programs. He enjoys living in Maine.

***William D. Jeanblanc, M.D.***

Dr. Jeanblanc completed his psychiatry residency at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center in Hanover, N.H. in 1988. Prior to joining the staff of Maine Medical Center, Dr. Jeanblanc served as Medical Director for inpatient and outpatient psychiatry services at Monadnock Community Hospital in Peterborough, N.H., where he practiced for 15 years following his residency training. While on the staff of Monadnock Community Hospital, Dr. Jeanblanc also served as President of the Medical Staff and Chair of the Ethics Advisory Committee. He is Board Certified in both Adult and Geriatric psychiatry and serves as the Director of Geriatric Psychiatry at MMC. His professional interests include treatment of refractory mood disorders, anxiety disorders, and medical ethics. Dr. Jeanblanc resides in West Bath with his wife, where they enjoy sailing and kayaking.

***Scott M. Klenzak, M.D.***

Dr. Klenzak graduated from Wake Forest University with a B.A. in chemistry and completed his medical degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1996. He went on to do both his residency and child fellowship training at UNC Hospitals. On completion of his fellowship, he relocated to Maine with his wife and family, entering private practice. He was based at St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Lewiston, Maine, doing both inpatient and outpatient work, including school consultation. He also provided consult/liaison services to Central Maine Medical Center. In 2004, he left private practice to join the medical staff at both Spring Harbor Hospital and Maine Medical Center. He directs one of two adolescent units at Spring Harbor, and he is part of the Odyssey Program, a SAMSHA grant studying treatment resistant youth in transition. His professional interests include teaching, ethics, psychopharmacology, and the history of psychiatry. He is board certified in general psychiatry with added qualification in child and adolescent psychiatry.

***Ann M.S. LeBlanc, Ph.D.***

Dr. LeBlanc serves as the Director of the State Forensic Service, which provides court ordered psychiatric and psychological evaluations in criminal cases. She is a Maine native, and a graduate of Colby College. She completed a B.S. in Health Science at the Johns Hopkins University, then served as the Administrator of the Kenyon College Health Center in Ohio. She completed doctoral studies at the Ohio State University, and an internship in clinical neuropsychology at the University of Tennessee Health Sciences Consortium in Memphis. Prior to her present appointment, she has served as a psychologist, Chief of Psychology, Assistant Superintendent, and Acting Superintendent at the Augusta Mental Health Institute, now Riverview Psychiatric Center. During several years of private practice, she conducted neuropsychological and forensic evaluation and consultation for the Bureau of Mental Retardation, the Maine State Prison, Disability Determination Services, and Adult Protective Services. She serves as a clinician for the Kennebec Valley Critical Incident Stress Team, and enjoys writing for Catholic periodicals.

***James H. Maier, M.D.***

Dr. Maier comes to the PIER Program from Sweetser Children's Services, where he worked primarily with severely troubled young people. He brings to the project over 25 years' experience in mental health, including a decade of public affairs work with the American Psychiatric Association, in addition to a busy and varied private practice in the community. Dr. Maier attended Amherst College and Tufts Medical School before completing an adult psychiatric residency at Maine Medical Center and a fellowship in child psychiatry at Philadelphia Child Guidance Clinic with Dr. Salvador Minuchin, a renowned leader in family therapy. Dr. Maier has been a supervisor of Maine Medical Center residents teaching family therapy from the early days when it was still a subversive discipline. Having a son with severe bipolar disorder (now stable, married, and living in Norway) has sensitized him to the crucial need for a supportive early intervention program for young people and their families. More recently Dr. Maier has been the primary psychopharmacologist for the PIER Program, offering early intervention to successfully prevent psychosis in young people in Greater Portland.

***Robert V. McCarley, M.D.***

Dr. McCarley attended medical school at George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He attended and graduated his residency in psychiatry at the

Harvard Longwood psychiatric program in Boston at the Brigham and Womens Hospital, Beth Israel-Deaconess Medical Center and the Massachusetts Mental Health Center. Dr. McCarley is currently the Medical Director of the Partial Hospital Program at MMC and works halftime in the Adult Mental Health Clinic. He is involved with both the residency training program and with the medical education of the medical students.

***William R. McFarlane, M.D.***

Dr. McFarlane is Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Vermont, Department of Psychiatry and Director of The Center for Psychiatric Research, Maine Medical Center and Spring Harbor Hospital. Previously, he was the Chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at Maine Medical Center and before that Director of the Biosocial Treatment Research Division and the Fellowship in Public Psychiatry of the New York State Psychiatric Institute and an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University. He has been working with families of the mentally ill, especially in multiple family groups, since his training at Albert Einstein College of Medicine in Social and Community Psychiatry, from 1970-75. He edited *Family Therapy in Schizophrenia*, published in 1983 and recently published *Multifamily Groups in the Treatment of Severe Psychiatric Disorders*. He is a graduate of Earlham College and Columbia University, College of Physicians and Surgeons. His main research interests are in developing and testing family and social treatments for major mental illnesses and prevention of severe mental illness. He has published more than 40 articles and book chapters, is an Associate Editor of *Family Process* and *Families, Systems and Health* and on the Board of Directors of the Association for Clinical Psychosocial Research. In 2003, he was awarded the Distinguished Contribution to Family System Research Award by the American Family Therapy Academy and in 2004, the Warren Williams Award by the American Psychiatric Association. He is presently testing a model of prevention of psychotic disorders that involves early identification of youth in the prodromal phase of schizophrenia and other psychotic disorders. This model population-based service, Portland Identification and Early Referral (PIER), is the only one of its kind in the US, having trained nearly 3500 educators, mental health clinicians and physicians in the early signs of psychosis, prior to onset. In turn they have become proficient in identifying and referring quickly youth at risk. The treatment provided, Family-aided Assertive Community Treatment (FACT), offers intensive support and guidance to family members, support for the young person's education or employment and low-dose medication for symptoms. It is now being tested under NIMH support to determine the relative efficacy of the psychosocial aspects of the treatment model. Other projects include study of the causes and long term outcomes of children born with brain ventricle enlargement, as a possible means of primary prevention of schizophrenia.

***George N. McNeil, M.D.***

Dr. McNeil is a graduate of Amherst College and Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. He spent his early post-graduate life in primary care before doing his psychiatry residency at Maine Medical Center. He has been Director of Residency Training at Maine Medical since 1979. In addition to his interests in resident and medical student education, he has maintained an interest in primary care medicine, has worked as a preceptor in the Family Practice residency for the past twenty years, and is board certified in psychosomatic medicine. He also maintains an active practice in psychotherapy. Dr. McNeil's teaching assignments range from a course in Freud and psychoanalytic theory to seminars on molecular biology and neuroscience

***Jonathan E. Morris, M.D., M.P.H.***

Dr. Morris was born in Denver, raised in North Carolina, and moved to Maine in 1987. He received a BS with Honors in Biology from Stanford University, and subsequently Masters in Public Health (M.P.H.) and M.D. degrees from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Dr. Morris completed postgraduate training and a Fellowship in Community and Administrative Psychiatry at the UNC Hospitals in Chapel Hill. Dr. Morris has been on the faculty at the Maine Medical Center and the University of Vermont College of Medicine since 1987. Professional interests in addition to clinical psychiatry include medical student and house staff education, consultation-liaison psychiatry, community consultation and teaching, administration, clinical research, managed care issues, and maternal and child health. Dr. Morris's personal interests include film and video photography, films, novels, hiking, travel, the U.S. Territory of Guam, and enjoying life with his wife Suzan, four cats, and a dog.

***John M. Murphy, M.D., M.P.H.***

Dr. Murphy graduated from St. Louis University Medical School and received his MPH from UCLA. Dr. Murphy completed a Pediatric Residency at Kaiser Permanente in Los Angeles and worked as a pediatrician for ten years. He is board certified in pediatrics. He then did his general psychiatry residency and child psychiatry subspecialty training at Los Angeles County-USC. He is an attending on the Children's Unit at Spring Harbor Hospital. He is board certified in general psychiatry with added qualification in child and adolescent psychiatry.

***Glenn D. Prentice, M.D.***

Dr. Prentice received his M.D. and his psychiatric training from the University of New Mexico. Post-graduate studies include training in Jungian Analysis. His Board certified in psychiatry, with added qualifications in geriatric psychiatry. He has held academic positions at the Naropa Institute, Northwestern Medical School, Chicago Medical School, and now at the University of Vermont Medical School. He has been medical director of two comprehensive mental health centers in New Hampshire. He has extensive experience in psychotherapy (both brief and long-term), and in diagnosis, psychopharmacology, and ECT. He works to find ways to both relieve symptoms and promote the growth of the individual.

***Daniel Grant Price, M.D.***

Dr. Price is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in Philadelphia. He completed residency at the combined Massachusetts General Hospital and McLean Hospital Adult Psychiatric Residency Training Program. In his fourth year he was Chief Resident of the Bipolar and Psychotic Disorders Program at McLean. Dr. Price is currently divides his time between the P-6 inpatient unit, and the MMC Consultation-Liaison team. His interests include Personality Disorders, Psychotic Disorders, Resident and Medical Student Education, and the Philosophy and History of Psychiatry. Prior to beginning medical training Dr. Price completed a Masters in Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University, and worked in various private sector positions.

***Girard E. Robinson M.D.***

Dr. Robinson graduated from the State University of New York at Buffalo, School of Medicine. He completed both his internship and residency in Psychiatry at The New York Hospital, Cornell Medical Center, Payne Whitney Psychiatric Clinic. He continued at the Payne Whitney Psychiatric Clinic and completed his Fellowship in Child Psychiatry. After his fellowship, Dr. Robinson joined Maine Medical Center (MMC) as the Assistant Director of the Consultation-Liaison Service and Emergency Room. Still at MMC, he has served as Director of Inpatient Psychiatry, and is now the Chief of Psychiatry. Concurrently, he has been the Vice President for Medical Affairs/Chief Medical Officer of Spring Harbor Hospital since 1999. In this role, Dr. Robinson oversees medical operations for the more than two dozen programs within the Spring Harbor & Maine Medical Center network of mental health services. In addition to administration Dr. Robinson is actively involved in residency training as a supervisor and didactic instructor of psychotherapy. Dr. Robinson also has an academic appointment with Department of Psychiatry, University of Vermont, as Associate Clinical Professor.

***Douglas R. Robbins, M.D.***

Dr. Robbins trained in General and Child Psychiatry at the University of Colorado Medical Center and he has served on the faculties of the University of Michigan and Brown University before coming to Maine Medical Center. He has conducted research on the assessment of depression and suicide in adolescents, biological correlates of major depression in adolescence, psychotherapeutic and psychopharmacological treatment of depression, and the natural history of adolescent-onset bipolar disorder. He has directed treatment programs for children and adolescents in inpatient, day treatment, outpatient, correctional, and intensive community-based settings. Dr. Robbins's current interests include the interaction of psychosocial and biological factors in normal affective development and in the development of children at risk for affective disorders, and the development of treatment systems for psychiatrically ill children and adolescents.

***Diane H. Schetky, M.D.***

Dr. Schetky, a 1966 graduate of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine, is certified by The American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology in Adult and Child Psychiatry and has added qualifications in Forensic Psychiatry. She has been teaching forensic psychiatry for over 15 years at MMC where she holds the title of Clinical Professor of Psychiatry through The University of Vermont College of Medicine. She has published extensively in the area of forensic child and adolescent psychiatry and was principle editor of Principles and Practice of Child and Adolescent Forensic Psychiatry, which received the 2003 Guttmacher Award for outstanding contribution to the literature in forensic psychiatry. Her forensic experience includes corrections, child abuse and neglect, civil litigation, and assessment of criminal defendants. She has a private practice in Rockport, ME, which is now limited to forensic psychiatry. She is also a contracted examiner for The State Forensic Service.

***Lindsey Tweed, M.D., M.P.H.***

Dr. Tweed graduated from Dartmouth College, Duke University Medical School, and the University of North Carolina School of Public Health. He completed the general psychiatry and child and adolescent training programs at Duke; he was a clinical faculty member at Duke for five years before going back to get his child and adolescent training. Dr. Tweed's main interest is the care of seriously emotionally disturbed children from multiproblem families. In addition to being very interested in child and adolescent psychopharmacology, Dr. Tweed has received specialized training in a number of empirically supported psychosocial treatments (Dialectical Behavior Therapy, Multisystemic Therapy, Collaborative Problem Solving).

***Carlyle B. Voss, M.D.***

Dr. Voss graduated from Baylor Medical School. He completed his residency at the New York State Psychiatric Institute in New York City. At Maine Medical Center for 31 years, he has been director of adult outpatient services, the inpatient unit and research. He was Assistant Chief and is a Clinical Professor at Univ. of Vermont. Clinical activities focused on acute and long-term management of people with chronic major mental illnesses, including schizophrenia, mood disorders, and the effects of childhood abuse and neglect. He has done research in depression and cognitive function tests. Dr. Voss is board certified in Forensic Psychiatry and is the director of the MMC Division of Forensic Psychiatry.

***Edward L. White, M.D.***

Dr. White graduated from Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine and trained in psychiatry at the University of California, Davis. He is also a graduate of the San Francisco Psychoanalytic Institute. After several years as Medical Director of Inpatient and Psychiatric Emergency Services at UC Davis, he had a private psychotherapy and psychoanalytic practice in Sacramento for twenty-one years. For the past several years he has also conducted a psychiatric clinic within a methadone treatment program. He is a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at UC Davis, where he supervised residents and led a continuous-case conference every year. He has also taught in the San Francisco Psychoanalytic Institute Extension Program. He is a new and highly enthusiastic resident of Maine. Professionally, he is interested in professional ethics, in psychodynamic psychotherapy, especially for patients with depression and character disorders, and in the problems of addiction. His extraprofessional interests include photography, writing, cross-country skiing and sea kayaking.

***Duncan Wright, M.D.***

Dr. Wright graduated from the Yale University School of Medicine, where he wrote a thesis applying theories of adult development to the life of Henry James. He completed a residency at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in Bronx, New York, in 1986, by spending a year as chief resident on a ward at Bronx State Hospital. Since then he has worked in several settings, including a hospital unit for personality disorders, a prison, and a Family Practice residency. He came to Maine in 1995. His interests include emergency psychiatry, the sociology of psychiatry, (he wrote an article on this topic for the International Journal of the Health Services, published in 1998.) and the politics of achieving universal health care.
